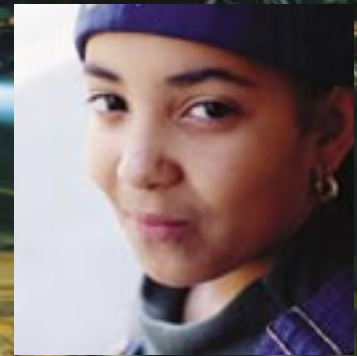




# Creating A Just Future

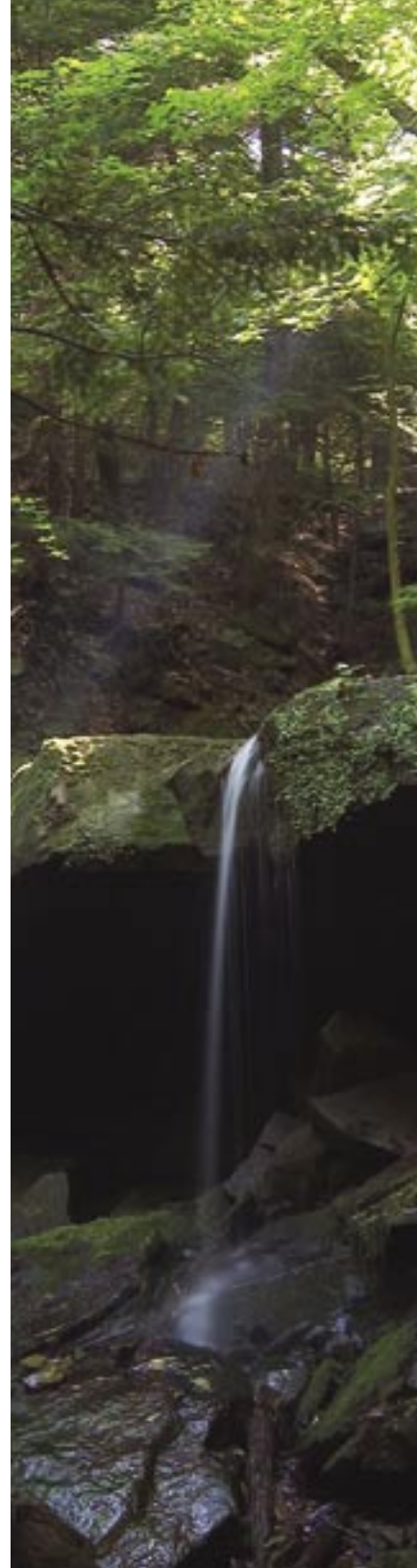

## PennFuture is:

- combating global warming, smog, acid rain, and illness, as well as the depletion of our natural resources, by compelling dirty power plants to clean up, and by fostering the transition to cleaner, renewable energy;
- leading efforts to enforce environmental laws against mining operations that threaten streams, homes and public infrastructure;
- battling to protect Pennsylvania's land and communities from huge factory farms, unsafe and unwise highway construction, unwanted landfill expansions and out-of-state waste, and from misuse of local zoning laws;
- working to protect and restore Pennsylvania's waterways from damage caused by acid mine drainage, development, and misuse, and to make those responsible pay to clean up their mess;
- promoting a shift in Pennsylvania's tax system to discourage sprawl and pollution while encouraging jobs and savings;
- advocating the increase of desperately needed funding for farmland preservation, and maintenance and preservation in our state parks, watersheds and game lands;
- ensuring that existing environmental laws are enforced and preventing the passage of laws harmful to the environment, by serving as a watchdog of the state legislature;
- representing anglers and hunters, environmentalists and concerned citizens in court against those who attack nature, and public officials who fail to do their duty to protect it;
- fighting to ensure that polluters and their allies no longer decide the fate of our environment and economy.

As the federal government turns its back on the Clean Air Act, Pennsylvania's citizens must rely on our own state government to protect our citizens' right to breathe.

At least 2,200 Pennsylvanians die prematurely each year from bad air — a toll greater than homicide and drunk driving fatalities combined. More than 1 million Pennsylvanians have respiratory illnesses that are aggravated or caused by air pollution. At high risk are the elderly, pregnant women, small children and anyone who exercises outside.

Bad air brings with it a huge price tag in health care costs. And the greenhouse gases Pennsylvania produces don't just make us sick — they contribute a full 1 percent to the world's global warming, as they poison our streams and fish, and destroy our forests.

#### DIRTY COAL-FIRED POWER PLANTS

The pollution spewing out of our power plants destroys our planet in many ways. It contaminates our food and water through fish and even breast milk laden with mercury — which can cause brain damage in newborns and small children. Soot pollution increases the risk of asthma, lung cancer, strokes and heart attacks. Acid rain destroys our streams and kills our forests. And power plant pollution is the leading cause of global warming.

#### DIRTY CARS, TRUCKS & OTHER VEHICLES

Larger, less efficient motor vehicles are the fastest growing source of greenhouse gases, with cars and trucks producing about one-third of the chemicals that produce smog.

#### DIRTY POWER PLANTS + DIRTY VEHICLES = GLOBAL WARMING

Pennsylvania's global warming forecast projects temperature increases of several degrees by 2030. Severe environmental impacts could include intense heat waves, changes in crop yields, enhanced spread of diseases, lower stream flows and the loss of cold water fisheries.

Global warming will disrupt our forest ecosystems — threatening the hardwood industry, maple syrup production, and our multi-billion dollar outdoor recreation and tourist industries. Pennsylvania's ski season will melt away as the climate warms. Trout are predicted to disappear from Pennsylvania's streams as temperatures rise, and the flaming colors of fall foliage will be little more than a fond memory as the forests change.

# Our goal is to stop pollution while dramatically increasing energy made from renewable sources – the wind, sun, earth and water.

## STATE GOVERNMENT COMMITMENT

Within one week of being sworn in to office, the new administration of Governor Ed Rendell promised to enforce the strictest clean air standards. At the urging of PennFuture and other environmental organizations, the governor filed suit against the Bush administration to stop it from gutting the Clean Air Act. In addition, the state recently completed an inventory of greenhouse gases — a first step towards our goal of reducing Pennsylvania's contribution to global warming.

## MAKING CARS AND TRUCKS CLEANER

PennFuture's win in federal court against the state Transportation and Environmental Protection departments extends stricter car and truck emissions testing across the state, guaranteeing all Pennsylvanians the right to cleaner air. PennFuture sued the state because of its failure to implement auto inspection procedures mandated by the EPA. The new inspections will be phased in between April 2003 and June 2004.

## STOPPING DIRTY POWER PLANTS FROM BEING BUILT

PennFuture, working with citizens groups, has stopped the state from granting permits to new dirty-fueled power plants. In Sewickley Township, Westmoreland County, Duke Energy proposed using both cleaner natural gas and dirty diesel fuel in their new plant. Thanks to our intervention, the state denied the use of diesel fuel in this plant, sharply cutting air pollution. And the elimination of diesel also ended any need for a diesel tank farm or trucks delivering the fuel.

PennFuture's Work for cleaner air has made a clear difference for Pennsylvania.

# Changing the Way We Make and Use Energy

In less than five years, we've gone from virtually no renewables to 2 percent. That's a great start, but we still have a long way to go!

# The single most powerful action people and institutions can take to stop pollution is to make the switch to clean, renewable energy.

The power industry devastates our health, our environment and our economy. Electricity made from burning coal and oil creates toxic air and water pollution. Nuclear plants leave behind lethal wastes for which there is no good disposal or storage, and they are expensive to build and even more expensive to keep secure.

PennFuture's new energy initiatives are aimed at stopping the pollution and dramatically increasing energy production from renewable sources — including wind, solar, biomass and small hydro.

- **GREEN POWER: *Turn It On!***™ is PennFuture's campaign to ensure that 10 percent of Pennsylvania's power comes from renewable sources by 2010. So far, 100,000 homes, 32 Pennsylvania colleges and universities, and hundreds of businesses and institutions are purchasing renewable energy,
- At PennFuture's GETTING TO 10 PERCENT conference in May 2002, Department of Environmental Protection Secretary Kathleen McGinty announced that the Commonwealth would double its renewable energy usage to 20 percent.
- PennFuture manages CLEAN YOUR AIR, a public education initiative of the Mid-Atlantic Renewable Energy Coalition (MAREC). With radio, TV and print ads, and the CleanYourAir.org website, MAREC partners are increasing regional demand for clean, renewable electricity by giving people all the information they need to make the switch.

## ELECTRICITY RATE CUT

PennFuture's active support for Pennsylvania's transition to a competitive retail electricity market means that in Pittsburgh residential electric rates have been cut to 1981 levels. Across the state, no customer is paying more now for electric service than in 1996, a rate decrease of 10.6 percent. Yet low-income customers and the environment are also protected. Pennsylvania's new lower electricity rates include a small charge to boost renewable energy technologies, energy conservation and payment assistance programs for low-income families.


## THRIVING RENEWABLE ENERGY MARKETPLACE

PennFuture's advocacy makes Pennsylvania a place where wind developers want to operate. We assist in networking and project development, financing and policy problem-solving, and technical services and marketing.

By the end of 2004, Pennsylvania will have eight wind farms in Somerset, Fayette, Wayne and Luzerne counties with a combined grand total of 188.6 megawatts, enough to power more than 180,000 households.

PennFuture's advocacy has meant real economic development for Pennsylvania. Thanks to our negotiations with utility companies and others, our state and region has moved forward with:

- \$37 million reserved for renewable energy development across the state;
- \$12 million dedicated to wind power leveraged with private money, resulting in at least \$220 million in new wind farm development in Pennsylvania;
- A total of eight operating wind farms expected online by June 2004, six of which — enough to power 55,000 homes — would not have been possible without our advocacy;
- \$4 million for solar power development, resulting in solar power plants in residences and businesses throughout eastern Pennsylvania;
- \$2.5 million for community education about clean renewable energy, including radio advertising, full-page ads in magazines, and a vibrant website;
- \$3.5 million in startup capital for Community Energy, the area's premier marketer of wind power. Community Energy now employs 16 people and is doing business throughout Pennsylvania, as well as in New York, New Jersey, Illinois, Massachusetts, and Washington DC;
- \$5 million from the departments of Environmental Protection and Agriculture to fund the Energy Harvest program;
- 66 megawatts in new wind energy from the Mountaineer Wind Farm in West Virginia;
- \$200 million in savings through lower electricity bills just in the Philadelphia area.



# Reclaiming Pennsylvania from the Legacy of Mining

When the nine Queecreek miners accidentally drilled into an abandoned mine full of water, the world learned first-hand how dangerous mining could be.

The Quecreek workers were safely returned to their families, but other families must live every day with both the past and present damage that is inflicted on the communities above the mines. Mining has riddled the landscape with towering piles of coal refuse, collapsed mining structures, and destroyed homes and wells. Thousands of miles of Commonwealth streams are so damaged by acid mine pollution that they can no longer support aquatic life.

PennFuture is determined to protect coalfield communities and their land and water. We help local activists organize for change. We highlight the injustices they experience, making even those far removed from the coalfields aware of the problems. We demand that the government enforce the laws that exist, inadequate though they may be. And we are working to change the mining laws to restore control to the residents and businesses of Pennsylvania.

#### ACID MINE POLLUTION

Abandoned mines fill with water that mixes with the coal left behind to become acid mine pollution. It seeps into the water table and so far, more than 3,000 miles of Pennsylvania's streams have been damaged. An estimated \$70 million is lost each year in recreational and fishing income because of this pollution, but in the past four years only a mere \$4 million has been spent to stop it.

This contaminated water takes a toll on citizens' lives. Contaminated local water supplies mean that coalfield resident Bill Gdoskey and his neighbors draw well water that is unfit for washing, much less for drinking. Meanwhile, in southwestern counties along the Monongahela River, orphaned mines are filling with highly polluted acid water, which will soon break out and discharge into the river and its tributaries.

The price tag for abandoned mine clean up is a staggering \$15 billion. PennFuture, representing the Pennsylvania Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs, Pennsylvania Trout, the Sierra Club Pennsylvania Chapter, Mountain Watershed Association and Tri-State Citizens Mining Network, has gone to court to force the state and federal governments to obey the law by making

the coal mine operators post financial guarantees big enough to correct any damage left behind. PennFuture's action plan also calls for increasing the amount of federal and state funds available to treat acid mine pollution.



#### LONGWALL MINING

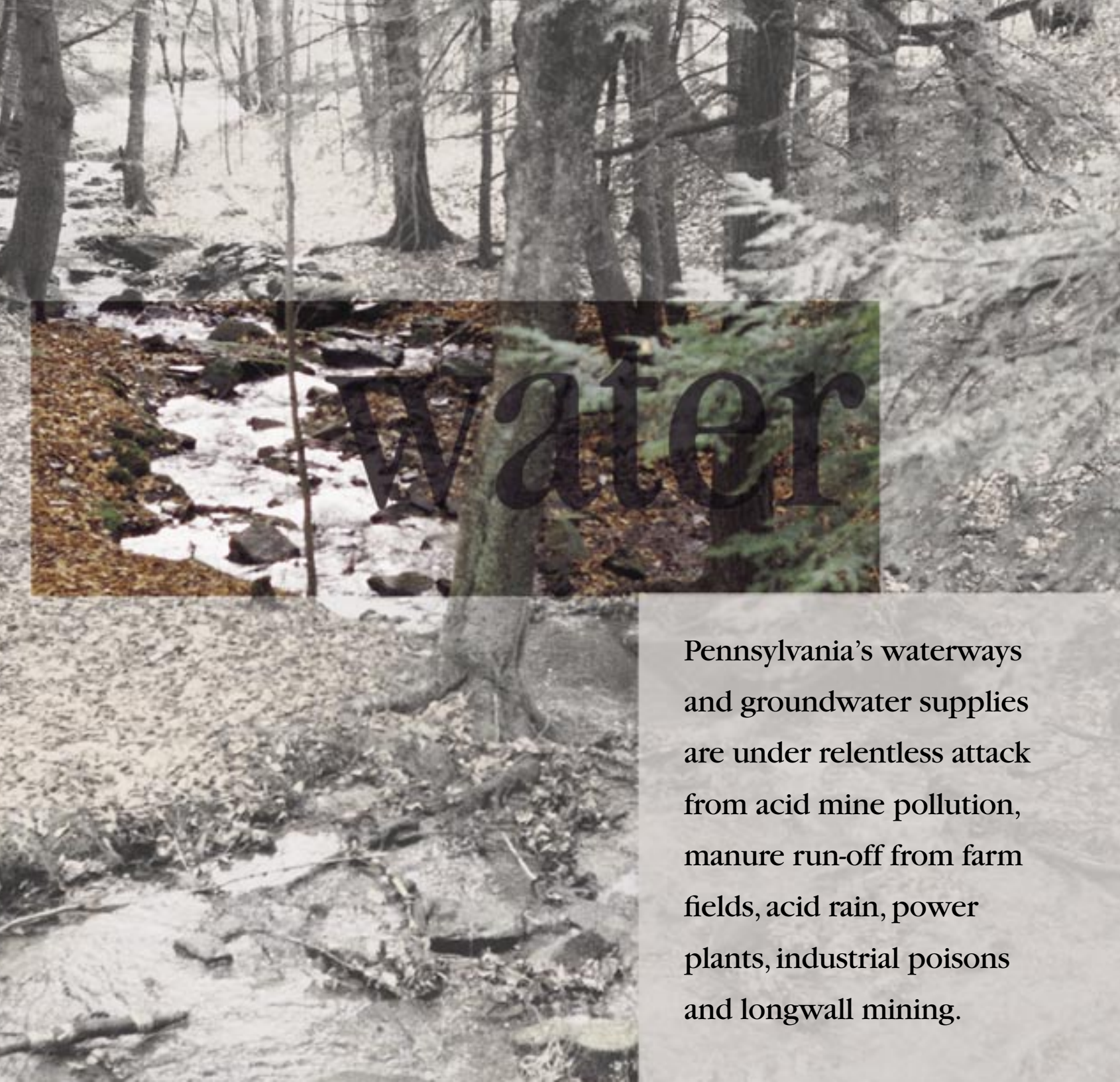
In the deep mines of Greene and Washington counties, longwall mining extracts huge panels of coal without leaving behind any supports for the earth's surface. In the resulting manmade earthquake, hundreds of square miles of watersheds and ecosystems have been damaged by subsidence, along with water mains and roads, homes and other structures.

The stress inflicted upon homeowners and entire communities is devastating. For example, Laurine and Murray Williams spent a decade restoring historic Kent Farm near Waynesburg, only to see their retirement dreams torn asunder when it was undermined. Under current law, citizens have no power to limit or object to the mining, and are often forced to accept damage settlements far below the actual damage to their property.

In Washington County, more than 400 homes are tentatively scheduled for undermining in 2004. PennFuture is fighting alongside property owners and farmers like Bill Lindley of Lone Pine, who desperately want to save their homes and farms and the water that sustains them.

As a result of advocacy by PennFuture and others, the Department of Environmental Protection recently began to require coal companies using the longwall mining method to fully assess the potential damage that mining might cause to the streams above their mines. PennFuture's vigorous advocacy for this decision against an appeal by mining interests cemented court precedent that stream damage caused by longwall mining is illegal pollution under Pennsylvania's strong Clean Streams law, and applies to all streams — not only the narrowly defined 'perennial' streams the coal companies and DEP have historically considered. Appeals on this issue continue, with PennFuture actively fighting for stronger stream protections.

We cannot move our economy forward without repairing the damage done by 19th Century environmental policies. Together with local activists, PennFuture is determined to move all of Pennsylvania — especially the coalfields — into the 21st Century.

## Protecting Our Water Supply

Pennsylvania's waterways and groundwater supplies are under relentless attack from acid mine pollution, manure run-off from farm fields, acid rain, power plants, industrial poisons and longwall mining.

PennFuture uses every tool available to protect our precious water resources and to stop the assault – including legal, legislative and regulatory strategies, public education and outreach. A few examples of our work:



#### EXCEPTIONAL & HIGH QUALITY STREAMS

Pennsylvania has more than 83,000 miles of streams and rivers, second only to Alaska in the total number of miles. Our waterways thread through our landscape and define the environmental quality of our communities. But more than 8,000 miles of Pennsylvania's rivers and streams do not meet the Clean Water Act's "fishable and swimmable" standard and are officially classified as degraded.

Conservation and angler's organizations are constantly faced with attempts to weaken the Special Protection Waters Program, and PennFuture battles on their behalf. We actively safeguard the law protecting Pennsylvania's Exceptional and High Quality streams.

#### PETROLIA

From the 1950s through the 1970s, toxic industrial chemicals were dumped into dozens of leaky sites around the village of Petrolia in northeastern Butler County. Despite clear evidence that wells and the drinking water supply — even the fountains at the local elementary school — were contaminated, the Department of Environmental Protection and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency took no action, and thousands of households were forced to rely on bottled drinking water.

In February 2003, PennFuture and a local citizens group, Small Towns Opposed to Polluted Sites, announced their intention to sue DEP, EPA and the companies involved. Within days, DEP finally moved to help the people of the Petrolia area — allocating \$10 million to start cleaning up the dumpsites, agreeing to build a new public water system and entering into settlement negotiations with the polluting companies. In May 2003, the main company involved, Beazer East, agreed to pay \$18.1 million towards repairing almost 40 years of damage.

#### DEER CREEK

PennFuture is fighting to save an undeveloped natural area from a massive mall complex proposed by a Texas developer. The 375-acre property contains valuable wetlands and a thriving trout stream. Part of the wetlands would be literally paved over and "big box" retail stores would surround the stream. PennFuture is in court on behalf of Pennsylvania Trout, Trout Unlimited-Penns Woods Chapter and PennFuture members. We are also challenging the \$25 million in Tax Increment Financing (TIF) granted to the developer, as an illegal use of funds, since TIFs are restricted for use on blighted lands.

#### MCCONNELL'S MILLS STATE PARK

In less than an hour, a Pittsburgher can travel to Slippery Rock Creek and stroll among wildflowers, scramble up a rock face or shoot the rapids. These are exactly the sorts of outdoor recreational activities that Pennsylvania needs to protect to keep young workers, who in turn attract businesses to the state. PennFuture and Friends of McConnell's Mills State Park successfully argued that allowing a 42-acre residual waste landfill to operate near the entrance to this breathtaking and much-beloved state park was a bad economic development strategy. The state Department of Environmental Protection agreed and the permit for the landfill was denied.

Protecting our waterways is sensible development. Tourism is Pennsylvania's second largest industry, employing more than half a million people. Travellers spent more than \$26 billion here in 1999. A polluted environment is simply not competitive. Our economic future depends on a clean and healthy environment where people want to live and work and play.



Pennsylvania loses 350 acres of open space, wildlife habitat, forests and farmlands every day to development. Urban centers are decaying as sprawl sucks the lifeblood from older communities. It doesn't have to be this way. PennFuture is working to revitalize our cities and maintain our family farms and beautiful green spaces, so that Pennsylvania can enjoy the economic opportunities that come with a healthy environment.

#### THE RESPONSIBLE FARMING CAMPAIGN

The Responsible Farming Campaign was created to protect rural communities, the environment and public health from the recent onslaught of virtually unregulated factory farms setting up shop in Pennsylvania. Manure from pig and poultry factories pollutes both air and water, and causes surrounding property values to plummet. Animal factories routinely add antibiotics to the animals' feed, exposing consumers to harmful antibiotic-resistant bacteria. Current state laws don't adequately regulate factory farms, tying the hands of local governments to regulate them. The Responsible Farming Campaign unites citizens, family farmers and township officials to press for adequate laws to control agri-business in Pennsylvania.

PennFuture is active on many fronts to address the threats posed by factory farms. We are working on state policy initiatives, and we help local groups mount sophisticated efforts to regulate factory farms or prevent them from locating in their communities. We provide legal assistance statewide. We helped organize a Rally for Rural Democracy at the state Capitol, had a visible presence at Farm Aid 2002, and co-sponsored the Third Annual National Sustainable Hog Farming Summit in Gettysburg.

#### THE CITIZENS' PLAN

The Citizens' Plan is PennFuture's alternative to the Mon-Fayette Toll Road, a poorly conceived \$4 billion boondoggle of a state highway project, originally proposed 40 years ago to ease traffic congestion around Pittsburgh. Despite a lack of funds, a collapsed steel industry and a 50 percent decline in population, the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission is still pushing for construction of the limited access toll road from Morgantown, West Virginia and up the Mon Valley to downtown Pittsburgh.

Community opponents and good government advocates contacted PennFuture for help in stopping the toll road from being built and destroying small towns and green spaces in the process. The group decided that an alternative to the toll road was vitally needed.

PennFuture's coalition of national and local experts — engineers, architects and planners — and interested citizens began work on the Citizens' Plan in early 2002. The group published a series of major reports, establishing that the toll road was a dismal use of public funds, would isolate the economically depressed communities of the Mon Valley, increase traffic congestion and destroy green space. The Citizens' Plan proposes the alternative of a network of urban boulevards within the Mon Valley to enhance safety, create incentives for economic growth, improve interstate connections to transport goods and decrease sprawl, while increasing real estate values, economic development, and environmental protection. The Citizens' Plan would also create far more local road building jobs than the Turnpike's plan.

The Citizens' Plan has been submitted to the federal government for consideration as an official alternative to the proposed toll road. In addition, PennFuture and the coalition are educating political leaders and community groups across the state that paying for the toll road would likely divert funds from vital bridge and road repair statewide.

# Meeting Extraordinary Challenges with Powerful Campaigns

# Restoring Civil Society: Making Citizens' Voices Heard

For too long, the only golden rule in politics was “those who give the gold make the rules.” PennFuture is determined to return the power of good government to Pennsylvania’s citizens, where it rightfully belongs.



PennFuture keeps Pennsylvania’s citizens informed about what is really happening in the corridors of the state Capitol. Armed with this knowledge and top-notch political, legal and communications skills, we lead a powerful statewide network of citizen activists to effectively defend the environment — and our future — in a loud and undeniable voice.

PennFuture insists that public officials be held accountable if they fail to protect our communities and natural resources. Strong environmental and health protection laws must be enforced. Where our state laws are inadequate to the task, PennFuture works to amend these laws, or to help draft new legislation from scratch.

## INFUSING ENVIRONMENT INTO THE POLITICAL DIALOGUE

During the election season, PennFuture educated the gubernatorial candidates by publishing “Greening the Environment, Growing the Economy — An Environmental Agenda for State Government.” In meetings with the major candidates, we detailed ten solutions for improving Pennsylvania’s economy and environment. We were pleased to note that many of our suggestions were incorporated into the campaign materials of two of the candidates.

PennFuture prepares a yearly Legislative Agenda for Action and presents it to every member of the Pennsylvania legislature. The agenda lists specific legislative initiatives that would move our state forward, making the promise of our Constitution’s Environmental Rights

Amendment a reality. Many of these initiatives have become state law.

After the general election each year, PennFuture sponsors a post-election debate, with leaders from both political parties joined by noted pollster G. Terry Madonna. This lively debate is broadcast statewide, providing citizens with an insiders’ view of both past and future elections.

## TAKING MONEY OUT OF POLITICS

PennFuture has been in the forefront of the drive to provide public financing for candidates for governor and lieutenant governor. In return, candidates would agree to limit their overall spending, restrict the amount of money that individuals and organizations can contribute, and to hold public debates. Passage of a public financing law would go a long way towards breaking big money’s grip on elections and returning government to the citizens of Pennsylvania

## ACTING AS PENNSYLVANIA’S ENVIRONMENTAL WATCHDOG

PennFuture’s ongoing presence in the state Capitol and our relationships with political leaders puts us in an ideal position to be a watchdog on issues dealing with the environment and economy.

At no time was this service more valuable than during the infamous 2002 lame duck session of the legislature. We worked round-the-clock with a coalition of legislators and activists to stop any last minute shenanigans that could harm the environment. Our daily e-report, “The Lame Duck Follies,” gave supporters around the state a bird’s-eye view of the legislative action and the opportunity to react quickly as events unfolded.

One of our toughest battles was the fight against a bill that would have taken away what little authority local governments have to regulate factory farms and the spreading of sewage sludge. We also fended off a last minute effort to exempt the oil and gas industry from key provisions in the Clean Streams Law. And we stopped an amendment in the Senate that would have made it nearly impossible for local governments to buy and protect land for recreation.

We believe that nothing is more effective than an active, organized corps of citizen advocates. Together with our members and volunteers, we are returning important, broad-based public participation to policymaking, and are strengthening the voices of Pennsylvania residents, voters and taxpayers in Harrisburg and beyond.

## A Solar-Powered Home of Our Own

In May 2002, PennFuture purchased a three-story historic building in Harrisburg, made possible by a major donation in the form of a sharply reduced sale price. Totalling more than 10,000 square feet, PennFuture uses about half of the office space and leases the rest to cut operating costs. With our office located directly across the street from the State Capitol, PennFuture staffers have easy access to the decision makers in state government.



PennFuture's plan to make our new building energy efficient began to be realized in June 2003, when we dedicated our rooftop solar power plant. The output of our 3.84-kilowatt plant is sold to the grid for pollution-free electricity even on cloudy days, helping to reduce the soot and smog created by dirty outdated power plants.

All three PennFuture offices — in Harrisburg, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh — are powered by 100 percent clean renewable wind energy. In just one year, our switch from traditional power to renewables avoids as much pollution as not driving 287,600 miles, taking 24.5 cars off the road or planting 13,661 trees.

### ENDOWMENT FOR PENNSYLVANIA'S FUTURE

The Endowment for Pennsylvania's Future has been created to ensure that PennFuture's work continues in perpetuity. All gifts to the endowment fund are tax-deductible and are placed in a permanent interest-bearing investment account. The principal of the fund is left untouched and continues to grow through direct contributions. Each year PennFuture uses the earned interest from the fund to support the organization's services and initiatives on behalf of Pennsylvania's environment and economy. It is the best way to ensure that Pennsylvania's environmental future is determined by its citizens, and not by polluters who would despoil it for their own gains.

### CLEAN POWER MARKETS, INC.

Restructuring our electricity market and making the transition to renewable energy creates a demand for new forms of industry tracking and record keeping. PennFuture has developed this important expertise as an outgrowth of our pioneering work in the renewables field. Our newly incorporated business, Clean Power Markets, tracks and verifies renewable energy certificates for compliance with state clean energy requirements. Our first contract is with the state of Wisconsin.

### ENVIRONMENTAL COMMUNICATIONS RESOURCE CENTER OF WESTERN PENNSYLVANIA

Established in 2001, the Environmental Communications Resource Center of Western Pennsylvania provides media training, ongoing technical assistance, market research and campaign development skills to environmental and conservation organizations in western Pennsylvania. The Center was established with the generous support of The Heinz Endowments. In workshops and seminars, with one-on-one mentoring, and hands-on experience in our state-of-the-art media lab, the Center provides an invaluable resource for getting environmental news and advocacy into the hands of the public.

Through legal representation, public policy advocacy, direct outreach and news and information, PennFuture's staff and members contribute to a healthier and more prosperous future for all Pennsylvanians.



#### LEGAL

PennFuture has provided at least \$3 million in free legal services every year since our inception in 1999. Our team of full-time environmental attorneys most often work outside the courtroom — filing comments on proposed regulations, drafting legislation, testifying at hearings and offering advice or referrals. We prefer to negotiate and avoid legal action. Yet when discussions fail, we move to compel enforcement of environmental laws. At any one time, PennFuture attorneys are handling between 10–20 cases that offer the opportunity for broad environmental impact.

#### LEGISLATIVE

PennFuture believes that representative government works best when citizens get involved in the lawmaking process. On behalf of our members and supporters, during the 2002 – 2003 legislative sessions PennFuture advocated for the enactment of laws to help protect and restore Pennsylvania's environment and economy. We opposed laws that would harm our communities and natural resources and threaten our economic future. We are a strong voice and watchdog for the environment in the state Capitol.

#### OUTREACH

PennFuture outreach staff working out of Philadelphia, Harrisburg, and Pittsburgh form an effective base for statewide environmental advocacy. We educate and engage our members in campaigns for strong environmental protection and provide assistance and advice to local grassroots organizations. We also serve as key facilitators of statewide and regional environmental, conservation and outdoors networks and coalitions.

Our super-volunteers, the PennFuture Partners, form a growing corps of citizen advocates from each of Pennsylvania's 203 legislative districts. Partners provide grassroots action on our issues, assist networking efforts in local communities and help staff PennFuture events. Partners keeps in regular contact with elected officials, keeping them abreast of local and statewide environmental issues.

#### COMMUNICATIONS

PennFuture is a leading source of environmental information, news and commentary for Pennsylvania's media. Our strategy includes developing print, radio, television and electronic press coverage for all of PennFuture's activities. We prepare staff and clients for press conferences and briefings, write and design media materials and handle day-to-day contact with the working press.

PennFuture's website is a wealth of information on environmental issues and advocacy opportunities across the state. More than 2,000 people regularly receive PennFuture Action Alerts and are encouraged to contact their elected officials using our state-of-the-art Legislative Action Center.

PennFuture's publications include the bi-weeklies *PennFuture Facts*, devoted to one environmental topic, and *E<sup>3</sup>*, which follows trends in the energy market. We publish frequent e-newsletters when action on issues is pending. We also publish numerous special reports.

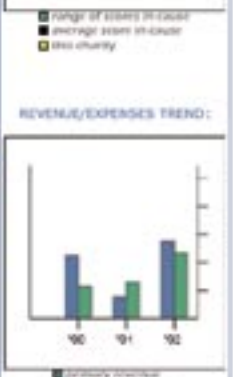
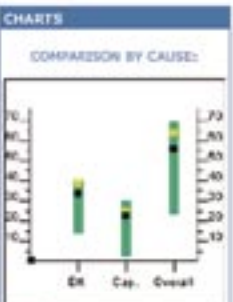

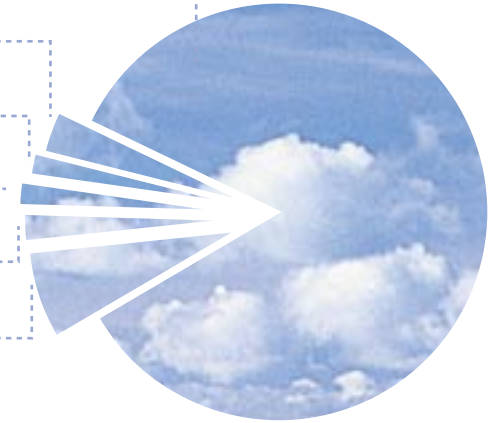
